## What Research is the LPRC @ King's Interested to Collect?

The LPRC @ King's collects social, cultural, environmental and population research with the goal of improving the health of the Canadian population, or of defined sub-populations, through a better understanding of the ways in which social, cultural, environmental, occupational and economic factors determine health status. The LPRC @ King's would like to house the research, links to research, or relevant research documents for the dissemination and access of the London community. These sources include:

- Literature Reviews/Annotated Bibliography
- Videos/Films
- Surveys/raw data

## What is Knowledge Translation?

“ Knowledge Translation (KT) is a systems approach to communication that transfers evidence-based knowledge from researchers, research centres, and organizations to intermediaries, practitioners, and end users who apply and utilize knowledge. Equally important, Knowledge Translation intentionally facilitates feedback mechanisms, so that the context, outcomes, and challenges experienced by intermediaries, practitioners, and end users informs researchers and knowledge generators in turn, in order to influence the questions they investigate, the solutions they prescribe, and the tactics they use to engage. ”
